

Time to Retire

Our first families have paid off their homes—becoming integral parts of our valley's social and tax structure.

Children have matured, doing well in a safe environment. We had a valedictorian and other scholars who have continued earning college degrees. I am so delighted to have been able to help.

However, now comes the time to refocus on our own We are trying to downsize our 45 years collection of living in our Cataldo home. We expect to move to a smaller space this year since Verne is fighting dementia and I cannot keep up with the house & yard.

So we will be leaving the Board of Directors in May after my 80th birthday. I will mentor those willing to accept any of the various hats I have worn during these 27 years. John Hopper Gives a Quarter of a Century

A quarter of a century ago heavy equipment operator John Hopper made a decision to volunteer some time for Fuller Center in the Silver Valley. And, he has since become a major part of this significant charitable organization.

When he started helping out in 1994, it was known as Habitat for Humanity. It just seemed natural to offer his assistance because he owns an excavating company and was already clearing land, digging footings, preparing foundations and digging trenches for water and sewer

lines. When he learned he could extend that same work to help people who couldn't otherwise afford their own housing, he was all in.

"I saw where they needed help," Hopper said of Fuller Center. "They're always short on volunteers."

A hand on a shovel soon led to other duties. Once he saw the good that was being done, he has since expanded his services to include filling a term on the board of directors on more than one occasion.

"I like working with all the people associated with it," he said.

He said he has made many new friends, from the board members to the bicyclists who turn out to support that annual event known as Ride The Wall. As various fund-raising events are held each year, he keeps making more new friends.

"I don't usually know any of them when they come" to ride in the bicycle tour, Hopper said, "but I sure know them when they leave."

There is so much to gain from volunteering for Fuller Center, he noted. He likes being part of the construction work and seeing homes become available for folks who need them. He said he also enjoys seeing the joy and gratitude of the new home owners as they see a dream become a reality when they move in.

As a licensed realtor, he said he knows how difficult it can be for some people to qualify for a mortgage to

purchase a house. And as the value and prices of properties in the Silver Valley have risen recently, that only becomes more difficult. It is not only more difficult for low-income people to purchase a house, but also is increasingly more difficult for an organization dependent on donations to buy property for volunteers to fix up for habitation.

Hopper uses his realty credentials to help Fuller Center purchase property to build or renovate a house. He was involved just recently in making an offer on a house in Smelterville and completing the sale.

He will next become involved in any excavation work that might be needed on that property as other volunteers do other construction necessary.

- * "Ride the Wall" attracts many riders from N. ID, Wash., & some other states.
- ❖ Youth Servant Adventurers from Shoshone Mountain Retreat come every year.
- ❖ Fuller Center Bicycle Adventurers stop on their rides across the US. They worked on 6 projects when here in 2019. Returning in 2020.

Education *** We provide instruction! ***

- ❖ We spend parts of 7 or 8 weeks each summer working with youth from the Shoshone Mt. Retreat on our construction sites. [Since we now are doing "Greater Blessings Projects" we have more sites.]
- ❖ We have hosted various schools, NIC, & U of I groups.
- ❖ We work with "Community Service" people needing to put in their hours.
- ❖ We are willing to train volunteers who come to the work site.
- ❖ We train our families how to become good homeowners—legal issues; repair; & especially in budgeting.

Publicity

- ❖ We try to keep the public informed through our monthly "Silver Bulletin"—mailing about 1300, handing out over 300 and emailing almost 300.


