How We Became a Partner With The Rose Lake Quick Response Unit

Rose Lake Quick Response Unit

The Rose Lake Quick Response Unit began about 1983. According to the State of Idaho, Articles of Incorporation the Rose Lake Quick Response Unit was formally incorporated May 7, 1985. The board of directors at the time of incorporation consisted of Dan Wadsworth, Helen Chatfield, and Clyde Roose.

The purpose of the organization was to provide volunteer emergency medical services throughout the area between Cataldo and the top of 4th of July pass and down Highway 3 to Indian Springs (near the Harrison Junction). Newspaper clippings from the time period show the first vehicle that the QRU used. It was a 1962 Pontiac station wagon ambulance that was donated to them by Harrison Ambulance. Also pictured in that photo were Jan Meyers, Dustin Howe and Claudia Howe.

The volunteer organization operated as the Rose Lake QRU until November 3, 2017 when the organization formally merged with Shoshone County Fire Protection District # 2. While the organization is under a new name it still operates primarily with volunteer help. One of the reasons for the consolidation was the diminishing number of volunteers to keep the organization an independent group. The same people who volunteered for the QRU were also volunteers for the fire district.

In reading through newspaper articles from the 80's they had the primary challenge that still exists today, that is the lack of volunteer help. Anyone interested in becoming a First Responder or EMT is encouraged to contact Shoshone County Fire District # 2 at 208-784-1188.

The current quick response unit volunteers include Steve Knox EMT, Kathy McPherson EMT, Bob Grigg 1st responder, Mike White, Tyler White, Teresa White EMT, Megan Costa EMT, Jeff Passer EMT, Bernie Wilmarth, John McFaddin. There are currently QRU vehicles stationed at the Doyle Road Station, Medimont Station and Pinehurst Station. The current coverage area consists of the area between Cataldo and the top of the pass and down highway 3 to Willow Creek, which is 1 mile south of Medimont.

There have been many people who have made monumental contributions to this organization, all of them deserve recognition for their contributions but since a list of all persons is not available it cannot be published.

Our Involvement with the QRU

JUNE 21, 1998 THE LONGEST DAY OF THE YEAR In the spring of 1998, the bike trail was being finished in Kellogg. I called Mike Domy at Excelsior Cycle to get his opinion about organizing a bike fund raiser. He suggested I attend an organizational meeting that evening which Joe Peak was holding at the Snake Pit to include the Old Mission Park Service and the Rose Lake Quick Response Unit (QRU). The idea was to hold a bike ride to raise funds for the QRU.

When I expressed an interest in collaborating with them, they asked what we could do to help. I explained we would provide media exposure (such as this newsletter) and insurance. Thus our partnership began where we share the profits.

For the first 4 years, the ride was called Bridge the Years (Bike the Wall) since it bridged the 2 oldest local buildings, the Mission Inn and the Snake Pit (Enaville Resort). About 60 participants rode from the Mission, across the Dike Road, turned right onto the Canyon Road, then up the CCC Road, crossing the bridge near Alberts, and finally arriving at the Snake Pit where Joe provided a BBQ. That year, we cleared \$400—\$200 for each. Three year later there were 170 riders.

THE LONGEST DAY OF THE YEAR In 2002, the Trail of the Coeur d'Alenes was completed so the bikers rode the loop, starting in Enaville, circling back to the Snake Pit as they still do. It is a safer and more efficient ride since the bikes do not need to be transported back to the starting place.



We have a personal appreciation for the QRU and Bobby Monteith. About 20 years ago, when the GPS equipment first came out, Bobby responded to a medical emergency. Fortunately he was a neighbor who knew where we lived since the GPS tried to send him on a road that had been closed for years.

Then in February 2005 during a very dry period, we had a roof fire. Bobby was the first responder followed by the crew from Shoshone Fire District #2.

Our sincerely thanks to all of you. We miss you, Bobby.



In 1999 Silver Valley Habitat for Humanity was invited by Habitat and Jimmy Carter to help provide housing at The Jimmy Carter Work Project in the Philippines.

So Judy and I went to the Philippines and volunteered to work on homes there. Since I was a site supervisor in the Silver Valley, I was asked to supervise construction on 2 of the 130 homes at our location. There were 6 locations throughout the various islands building a total of 293 homes.

Jimmy Carter was so sincere in providing adequate facilities for these homes that he personally came to each house, including the two where I was supervising, to check to see if all the basic features had been installed (such as the water and sewage facilities).

I know I will never again have the honor of working with a greater man than you, Jimmy Carter.
