



Fuller Center Volunteers Can Be Very Active

Ellie Arguimbau came to the Silver Valley for the opportunities to enjoy in the outdoors. Through the Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing she has been able to bicycle all over the world without leaving the valley.

Ellie has been to many different places, starting out in Massachusetts where she grew up. Always drawn to the West, she chose to attend college at the University of Colorado in Boulder where she majored in history. That eventually led her to Helena, MT, where she worked for 35 years as an archivist for the Montana Historical Society. When she retired, she felt like Helena was growing too fast for her as she saw development taking over some of her favorite hiking trails.

She then moved to Kellogg, ID, because of the many opportunities for hiking, bicycling and skiing without having to take on a high cost of living. "There are not very many places that have outdoor possibilities where ordinary people can afford to live," she noted.

Within a few months she began volunteering for Fuller Center, which became a good fit for her because of the fund-raising events it offered for bicyclists. As a result, she has been a big help for the annual Ride The Wall bicycle event for over 6 years.

This year has been a different one for her, just as it has for everyone else. Because of the COVID 19 pandemic, Ride The Wall was lifted from the trails to a virtual version. The crowds of people who gather each year at Enaville to register for Ride The Wall was not going to be conducive to the health recommendations of social distancing. As a result, the event was one of many events this year that took on a virtual transformation. People were asked to register online and submit photos of themselves bicycling on routes of their own choosing while wearing Ride The Wall t-shirts.

Meanwhile, The Fuller Center International organization was facing the same issue with their annual cross-country bicycle ride and came up with the Global Home Challenge. In the past, participating bicyclists would stop off at Kellogg and many other communities on their way and spend a few days helping with local construction projects for lower income families. But again, this year was different.

This year, in The Fuller Center International's Global Home Challenge, volunteers were asked to register and choose their own locations to bicycle or walk whatever distance they felt able to do. While that meant there would be no volunteer construction workers, it did allow folks to help raise funds for underprivileged people in poorer parts of our country as well as third-world countries, to obtain improved housing of their own. Over 100 people took part around the country.

"I was involved in both of them," Ellie said of the virtual events. She helped organize a team representing the Silver Valley, and they were part of many groups all over the United States who were able to virtually log in miles all around the world, from Nepal to Columbia. While it meant no hands-on work for those joining these events, raising the funds through donating the registration money and recruiting sponsors is very important.

As a member of the Silver Valley Fuller Center governing board, she has noticed the volunteer labor has been harder to come by locally even before the corona virus hit, largely due to a growing older age demographic in the valley. There's not enough volunteer labor so we're hiring out some of the work," she said. The Fuller Center has not built any new houses from scratch for a number of years due to the high cost and lack of volunteers, but sometimes lower-income families are helped in the purchase of a fixer-upper house in which they provide some of their own sweat equity to get it where it needs to be for habitation. Other times, through the Greater Blessings Program, an older couple or person might receive help in needed repairs to houses they already own and be allowed to pay back the costs over time at whatever they can afford per month. No interest is charged with either program. Whatever the situation may be, Fuller Center needs funds to make these things happen, so with the generous support of local businesses we have held numerous fund raisers such as Ride the Wall, our annual walkathon, and participating in the Osburn Craft Fair.

However, Ellie isn't going to stay in front of a computer working on how to overcome a pandemic. In addition to skiing and walking, Ellie likes riding her recumbent tricycle, and has been trying to do 10 miles on it most days. "I'm not a hard-core bicyclist by any means," she said. But she added, "I'm not going to sit in my house and do nothing. I need to get out every day. I've got to keep active."

And active she is. Ellie also volunteers at the Kellogg and Pinehurst libraries. Volunteering has always been an important part of her life. During her college years she was involved in the Civil Rights movement by working in the Mississippi Freedom Summer where she helped register Black people in the Freedom Democratic Party, which was interracial, because they were barred from joining the Democratic Party, much less exercising their right to vote. "Like most 19-year-olds, I felt invulnerable," she said. But she still paid a price. "My uncle, who lived in Mississippi, disowned me and said I was no longer a part of the family."

It was a tumultuous time, as it has been in some areas of our country this year. But, things can get better. Just as it has become easier for minorities to vote these days, the Fuller Center is helping fulfill dreams of home ownership for many people who might not otherwise be able.


